













The Granddaughter Necklace

Both my husband and I come from families with a long line of strong women coming from all around the world and from very different walks of life, and this book made us reflect on our relationships with the women of our families. Even if we don't have a physical necklace to pass down, we have wonderful stories that bind us together.

I loved sharing this story with our daughters Zoë and Natalie to highlight the importance of honoring one's history and lineage. The courage, the strength and the wisdom of those who came before us is somehow a part of us as well, and empower us, and help us become who we are today. It reminds us that life is not measured but what we acquire in a lifetime, but by what we give and leave behind.

The story captures the spirit of the women as well as the time and place in which they lived. Each woman receives the granddaughter necklace at a point early in her life when she feels vulnerable. The necklace acts as a reassurance to let the girl know that she is not alone; like a bead on a necklace, she is part of an endless chain that stretches back through time.



Radiant Child

Radiant Child is important to us because it details an amazing Afro-Latino artist's youth and subsequent meteoric rise to popularity. Basquiat revolutionized the art world and is still revered today. This book was especially exciting because we read it after seeing his work at the Broad Museum in downtown Los Angeles.

Winner of the Randolph Caldecott Medal and the Coretta Scott King Illustrator Award

Jean-Michel Basquiat and his unique, collage-style paintings rocketed to fame in the 1980s as a cultural phenomenon unlike anything the art world had ever seen. But before that, he was a little boy who saw art everywhere: in poetry books and museums, in games and in the words that we speak, and in the pulsing energy of New York City. Now, award-winning illustrator Javaka Steptoe's vivid text and bold artwork echoing Basquiat's own introduce young readers to the powerful message that art doesn't always have to be neat or clean--and definitely not inside the lines--to be beautiful.



Julián Is a Mermaid

Our book is *Julián is a Mermaid* by Jessica Love. In it, a child is inspired to make his own mermaid costume at home. His grandmother does not get upset with him - quite the opposite. She takes him to see a local parade of mermaids! Scenes in subway cars and neighborhoods are interspersed with sweepingly magical underwater illustrations, in a beautiful story celebrating the transformative power of unconditional love, imagination, and community.

While riding the subway home from the pool with his abuela one day, Julián notices three women spectacularly dressed up. Their hair billows in brilliant hues, their dresses end in fishtails, and their joy fills the train car. When Julián gets home, daydreaming of the magic he's seen, all he can think about is dressing up just like the ladies in his own fabulous mermaid costume: a butter-yellow curtain for his tail, the fronds of a potted fern for his headdress. But what will Abuela think about the mess he makes — and even more importantly, what will she think about how Julián sees himself? Mesmerizing and full of heart, Jessica Love's author-illustrator debut is a jubilant picture of self-love and a radiant celebration of individuality.









But what will Abuela think about the mess he makes — and even more importantly, what will she think about how Julián sees himself? Mesmerizing and full of heart, Jessica Love's author-illustrator debut is a jubilant picture of self-love and a radiant celebration of individuality.



When he gives the package to the stranger, in company of his parents, he sees the man stand up to shake his father's hand. He is a man, like his father, and the little boy feels happy to have given the man his dignity back.
