

# History-Geography

## Course Description

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This course follows the French curriculum and is taught both in French and in English (2 periods in French; 2 periods in English).

The aims of the course are:

- I) to build concrete historical and geographical frameworks and notions that students will be able to use moving forward
- II) to introduce and develop skills in analysis, expression, and elaboration both verbally and in writing of both primary and secondary sources
- III) to promote debate, discussions, group work and autonomous work (research).

In History, the curriculum is centered on the idea of Freedom and Social Rights -student focus on XVIII-XIX<sup>th</sup> century history and discover how people fought for the liberty (in USA and in France), working on fundamental texts (Bill of Rights, Declaration of Human Rights, Code Civil...), and the great changes of XIX<sup>th</sup> century Europe (Industrial Revolution...). In Geography, the accent is put on the notion of Globalization: integrated or peripheral areas, human mobilities, international trade. Students will work on precise case studies and global maps.

In Civics, some chapters will be incorporated into history or geography units, and some will be taught independently.

## Timeline

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### Semester 1

**History:** Merchant bourgeoisies, traders and slave trade; the Enlightenment; the French Revolution; the American Revolution.

**Geography:** Seas and Oceans: a maritized world; World Urbanization: dynamics, space and landscapes of urbanization; urbanization and globalization;

### Semester 2:

**History:** The Industrial Revolution; Colonial Conquests: the French and English model; Politics, Culture and Society in XIX<sup>th</sup> century France (History of the Right to Vote, the III<sup>rd</sup> Republic, French Women in 19<sup>th</sup> c.).

**Geography:** Human mobilities: Migration, Tourism; The consequences of Globalization -Globalization in Africa and the adaptation of United States to globalization.
